Brief Summary of Application:

Summary of Project:

The Missouri Behavioral Risk Factor Surveillance System (MO BRFSS) has been in existence for over 30 years providing data for use to identify program and policy needs and to monitor progress in meeting objectives to improve the health of Missourians. The MO BRFSS is the primary surveillance system for monitoring chronic diseases and conditions, the leading causes of morbidity and mortality in the state. According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), approximately 6 out of every 10 Americans live with at least one chronic disease; in Missouri, that figure is closer to 7 out of every 10. In 2018, chronic diseases such as heart disease, cancer, chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD), stroke, diabetes and asthma contributed to more than 57.6% of all deaths in Missouri.

Reviewers' Comments on Approach

Strengths of Section:

- The applicant describes numerous internal and external collaborations with BRFSS stakeholders including chronic disease programs, the Alzheimer's Association, the Missouri Alliance to Curb Problem Gambling, and many others.
- The applicant plans to increase use of their data by making it easier to obtain and use at the local level. They clearly outline how they plan to achieve this by noting the specific activities they plan to undertake to maintain use of their data and expand its use. They provide sufficient level of detail and how they plan to do this. They will also explore developing a new web-based query tool to make data more accessible and attractive to end users.
- The applicant notes all of the different programs and initiatives that use BRFSS data, and how the data are used to support tracking of their health department's strategic priorities (e.g. improving access to health care and tele-dentistry).
- The applicant contracts with the University of Missouri Health and Behavior Risk Research Center to conduct the survey, and they have 15 years of experience in this specific role.
- The applicant oversamples in select counties in the St. Louis and Kansas City metropolitan areas as part of the SMART BRFSS project. This helps to increase their sample size of African Americans, Asians, and Hispanics/Latinos. They have also been able to increase their sample size in the "bootheel" region of the state to monitor the high prevalence of chronic disease and risk factors in this area.

Weaknesses of Section:

Recommendations for Section:

Reviewers' Comments on Evaluation and Performance Measurement

Strengths of Section:

• The applicant provides a sufficiently detailed evaluation strategy that includes specific process and outcome evaluation questions.

Weaknesses of Section:

- The applicant could expand their evaluation plan to include engaging their stakeholders more in the evaluation plan development and reporting.
- Timelines and responsible staff members are not identified in their plan.

Recommendations for Section:

Reviewers' Comments on Organizational Capacity to Implement the Approach

Strengths of Section:

- The applicant identifies key staff members and their roles and responsibilities. The applicant notes they are co-located with many of their health department partners, so they are able to easily collaborate and maintain relationships with their stakeholders. They have been able to leverage these partnerships to provide financial support for various optional modules and state-added questions. They note that being able to add new optional modules to their survey has provided valuable data on occupations and industry to examine social determinants of health and injury risk.
- The applicant has experience disseminating BRFSS data through different avenues, and managing other surveillance systems. They are able to leverage their experience and technology to support their BRFSS efforts.
- The applicant provides information on how they monitor their contract with the University of Missouri to support survey administration, and how they ensure information is shared with them.

Weaknesses of Section:

- The applicant could strengthen their application by providing a solid example of a policy or system-change in their state that resulted from the strategic use of BRFSS data to identify and describe a specific public health problem. However, they do note that oral health questions were added because the health department director wanted to prioritize expansion of tele-dentistry.
- CVs weren't provided for all staff members listed on the project.

Recommendations for Section:

The applicant may want to strengthen their ability to track how BRFSS data are being used to inform system changes and policy development.
