Brief overview/summary of proposed continuation year activities

The Missouri Disability and Health Collaborative, located within the Missouri Department of Health and Senior Services (DHSS), in partnership with the University of Missouri-Kansas City-Institute of Human Development, is funded as a capacity building project to support individuals with intellectual disabilities (ID) to access the full range of evidence-based physical activity and nutrition programs provided through public health programs. The project will continue to build internal state capacity and expand disability and public health partnerships in Year 4.

1. Comments on current year performance/progress in meeting the purpose and goals of the program.

Program staff are making significant progress towards meeting their Year 3 objectives. They are on track to meet all three of the objectives including increasing the number of connections between local public health and IDD service providers, increasing the number of trainings for personal care assistants and IDD service providers, and identifying local public health agencies to pilot inclusion strategies. The program continues their partnership with the University of Missouri Kansas City Institute for Human Development (IHD), University Center for Excellence in Developmental Disabilities (UCEDD). Working closely with the IHD, the program has launched their training program for the *Better Communities for Better Health* local sub-awardees. In addition, *The Charting the LifeCourse for Health*, a training and education curriculum for people with IDD, their families and caregivers, is scheduled to begin in the spring of 2019. Local public health agency staff also attended a 2-1/2 day Community Change Academy to improve skills in building a coalition and assess community readiness for change using the Community Health Inclusion Index (CHII) assessments. The participants rated the training as effective and useful for their work at the local level. The team will offer additional training (e.g., Disability 101 and Universal Design) in Year 4 to

local public health agencies and IDD service providers. During the past year, Missouri launched their resource website to enable local programs to connect with other local communities and share information. Since the website is new and still being populated, no metrics are available at this time. Finally, the Advisory Committee continues to meet regularly and has provided guidance on training and educational events and resources.

2. Comments on new budget year objectives as to being realistic, specific and measurable. Provide comments about the proposed work plan and identify major issues/concerns with the proposed plan.

The awardee's new budget year objectives are realistic, specific, and measurable, building upon Year 3 strategies, activities, and successes. The awardee continues their strong partnership with the Preventive Health and Health Services Block grant programs throughout the state. In year four, the grantee proposes two new objectives and will continue two existing objectives. The new PPSE strategy will support three local public health agencies to pilot inclusive nutrition and physical activity strategies for people with disabilities. These three communities will be given additional planning tools and enhanced technical assistance from the University of Missouri-Kansas City IHD to guide strategy development and implementation.

In the workplan, several issues need to be addressed.

- The baseline people reach descriptions are too long and need to be shortened to fit the available space.
- The new Dissemination and Communication AO strategy aims to increase the number of public health professionals accessing the collaboratives resources, however, no partners are listed to assist in this work.
- The Technical Assistance AO strategy and reach numbers are not in alignment. The strategy states that the grantee will increase the number of training opportunities to increase implementation of environmental changes from 0 to 3. However, in the description, the baseline reach/unit number is listed as 3.
- 3. *(Use only if appropriate)* Identify and discuss any proposed changes in long-term objectives, methods of operation, and need for financial support, and the likelihood that such modifications will lead to achievement of project objectives.
 - The awardee has not proposed changes in long-term objectives, methods of operation, and/or need for financial support.

5. Comment on the continuation year budget request: Discus whether the budget is reasonable, clearly justified, and consistent with the intended use of funds.

Overall, the budget is reasonable, clearly justified, and consistent with the intended use of funds, however, the awardee requests funds for the AAIDD Membership fee of \$270, which is not an allowable cost.

6. Summary of Strengths of Application.

The project partners with University of Missouri Kansas City IHD, University Center for Excellence in Developmental Disabilities (UCEDD), which has enabled DHSS staff to benefit from the UCEDD's knowledge of people with ID and their health needs. By virtue of their location within the DHSS, the project has access to other health department programs and is positioned to include people with ID in existing health promotion programs and data collection, surveillance and monitoring efforts. The project is on track to meet their Year 3 milestones and measures.

7. Summary of Weaknesses and Concerns.

As previously mentioned, the proposed work plan will need revisions. The new Dissemination and Communication objective is missing the list of key partners. In addition, the Technical Assistance AO strategy and reach numbers do not align and will need updating.

8. Recommendations for new budget year activities and award level.

It is recommended that the awardee:

- Work with the Project Officer to finalize the Year 4 work plan within 30 days of receiving the Notice of Award;
- Update the Year 4 baseline measures with the actual numbers achieved in Year 3;
- Revise the budget, eliminating unallowable costs.
