

AVOID WILD ANIMALS



Rabies is a deadly disease caused by a virus that attacks the nervous system. The virus is secreted in saliva and is usually transmitted to people by a bite from an infected animal.



In Missouri, skunks and bats are the wild animals most likely to carry rabies.



If bitten by any animal, wash the wound immediately with soap and water for 10 minutes.



Following an exposure to rabies, a person should visit a physician as soon as possible to see if a series of shots is needed to prevent onset of the disease. Once symptoms begin, the outcome is almost always death.



People usually know when they have been bitten by a bat. Sometimes bats don't leave an obvious bite wound.

> If a person awakens and finds a bat in the room, or sees a bat in the room of an unattended child, seek medical advice and have the bat tested.
