American Indian and Alaska Native children have a greater risk of getting some diseases than other U.S. children.

What is the Vaccines for Children program?

The Vaccines for Children program is funded by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and provides free vaccines for children who qualify.

Does my child qualify?

American Indian and Alaska Native children, before their 19th birthday, can get vaccines through the Vaccines for Children program at no charge.



All vaccines are free through the Vaccines for Children program. However, parents may be charged a small fee by the doctor's office for an office visit and an administration fee each immunization.

Where can I get my child vaccinated?
