HEAD START LEAD TESTING EVENT SIGN-UPS!!!

The DHSS Childhood Lead Poisoning Prevention Program (CLPPP) wants to partner with you to offer testing events at your local Head Start. What does this look like? DHSS will provide test kits and the point-of-care testing device along with staff to run the machine, local Health Departments will provide lancets, band aids, stickers (optional) and nurses to collect the blood, and Head Start programs will get consent for testing from the parents. We travel onsite to conduct the event, which helps families access lead testing opportunities. CHRONIC TRAUMA

The connection between trauma exposure and long-term health problems is becoming clearer – and the health care sector is now focusing on how to care for patients with a history of trauma. Serious health issues can be the result of trauma, leading to poor health outcomes and higher social services and medical costs. Clinical practice and organizational culture can be changed to reflect trauma-informed principles. This has the potential to improve health outcomes, improve patient engagement and improve providers and staff wellness. *Key Ingredients for Successful Trauma-Informed Care Implementation* is a brief that was produced by the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation and led by the Center for Health Care Strategies. The aim is to implement trauma-informed principles and approaches into health care delivery. MEN'S MENTAL HEALTH

Men's mental health is highlighted every June. There's still a stigma around men's mental health, making it more difficult for men and boys to reach out for help. Some men might still feel as if people expect them to hide their emotions or be strong for others. Having a mental health condition is still seen as a sign of weakness or lack of masculinity among some men.

The <u>National Institute of Mental Health</u> says mental health conditions are more common among women than men, but this may be because men aren't opening up and reaching out. In 2021, 51.7% of women with a mental health condition received support from mental health services, while only 40% of men with a mental health condition received support. The <u>CDC</u> says the suicide rate among men in 2022 was around four times higher than the suicide rate among women.

WORLD ELDER ABUSE AWARENESS DAY

June 15 is World Elder Abuse Awareness Day, an event that seeks to unite communities around the world to raise awareness about elder abuse. In Missouri, the Department of Health and Senior Services (DHSS) receives and investigates reports of abuse, neglect, bullying and exploitation of some of the state's most vulnerable individuals - the elderly and disabled. Last year, DHSS received and investigated 41,929 reports, an average of about 115 each day. That number is on the rise, though the crimes are vastly underreported. Anyone who suspects a senior or disabled Missourian is being abused, neglected, bullied or exploited, should report to the Missouri Adult Abuse and Neglect Hotline at: 1-800-392-0210, which is operational from 7am through 8pm, 365 days a year. Online reporting is also available 24/7 at: Health.Mo.Gov/abuse. See attached for more information.

With guidance from the Section Chief of Health Planning & Policy, the Coordinator coordinates and integrates performance management (PM), quality improvement (QI), strategic planning, workforce development and evidence-based decision making into organizational practice while considering health equity. The coordinator assures that health center QI initiatives are focused and aligned to improve operational and program efficiencies and effectiveness, provides direction for QI policy development, and researches and develops QI training programs that focus on enabling the workforce to achieve improvements with priority health concerns. This position does not have direct reports, and the program manager/Section Chief will have overall accountability for staff.
