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HIGHLIGHTS

CENTER FOR THE STUDY OF TRAUMATIC STRESS

The <u>Center for the Study of Traumatic Stress</u> (CSTS) promotes the advancement of psychological health and resilience through trauma research, education, and consultation. Their mission is to advance scientific and academic knowledge, interventions, educational resources, and outreach to mitigate the impact of trauma from exposure to war, disasters, terrorism, community violence, and public health threats. The center's research in neuroscience and the neurobiology of stress aims to find effective interventions for Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD), mild Traumatic Brain Injury (TBI), and suicide. CSTS has developed an extensive library of resources, including the Child and Family Program (CFP). Disaster behavioral health is another area the Center provides leadership through consultation and dissemination of resources for disaster responders and communities.

JUNE IS POST-TRAUMATIC STRESS DISORDER (PTSD) AWARENESS MONTH

The month of June is dedicated to Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD) awareness. The U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs describes PTSD as a mental health disorder that develops after going through or seeing a life-threatening event. It's normal to have stress reactions to these types of events and most people will start feeling better after a few weeks. For some people, symptoms last longer and cause problems in their lives. If so, it could be PTSD. Anyone can develop PTSD at any age.

MEN'S MENTAL HEALTH

Men's mental health is highlighted every June. There's still a stigma around men's mental health, making it more difficult for men and boys to reach out for help. Some men might still feel as if people expect them to hide their emotions or be strong for others. Having a mental health condition is still seen as a sign of weakness or lack of masculinity among some men.

The <u>National Institute of Mental Health</u> says mental health conditions are more common among women than men, but this may be because men aren't opening up and reaching out. In 2021, 51.7% of women with a mental health condition received support from mental health services, while only 40% of men with a mental health condition received support. The <u>CDC</u> says the suicide rate among men in 2022 was around four times higher than the suicide rate among women.

PHAB Site Visit Training in Missouri

Earlier this year, the Missouri Public Health Institute conducted an interest survey for health departments interested in a site visit training. Fortunately, PHAB has finalized the TA request from MO DHSS and are moving forward with the Missouri Site Visit Preparation Training!

The in-depth preparation training will consist of **two sessions (totaling 4 hours)** and will cover:

- What to expect during the site visit.
- How to effectively present your LPHA.
- General preparation strategies.
- Coaching for staff, leadership, community partners, and governing entities.

• Guided practice answering common interview questions tied to specific measures. Each LPHA may register up to **two participants**. Inaugural Season of the Cancer Survivorship ECHO Program
