

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
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Flu Shots: Get the Facts

When should I get my flu shot?

It takes two weeks after vaccination for antibodies to properly develop in your body, so getting your flu shot in early fall is recommended, but flu shots are available through January and later.

Who should get a flu shot in my family?

Anyone over 6 months old can and should get a flu shot annually.
