- Getting people with HCV into treatment








Pre-Exposure Prophylaxis

PrEP

- PrEP (pre-exposure prophylaxis) is a medication that prevents HIV.
- PrEP is now available in an oral and injectable form.
- Almost anyone can use PrEP.




PrEP

 The goal of PrEP is to prevent an HIV-negative person from acquiring HIV from an HIV-positive partner.



PrEP

- PrEP is about 99 percent effective at preventing HIV through sex when taken as prescribed.
- PrEP only prevents
 against HIV. Condoms
 are still important
 to prevent other STIs.

Do You Have The Facts On PrEP? What is it?

Pre-exposure prophylaxis (or PrEP) is medicine taken to prevent getting HEV. PrEP is highly effective for preventing HEV when taken as prescribed.

- . PrEP reduces the risk of getting HIV from sex by about 99%.
- . PrEP reduces the risk of getting HIV from injection drug use by at least 74%.

PrEP is less effective when not taken as prescribed. Since PrEP only protects against HTV, condom use is still important for the protection against other STDs. Condom use is also important to help prevent HTV if PrEP is not taken as prescribed.











Disease Intervention Specialists Overview

What are Disease Intervention Specialists?

Disease Intervention Specialists (DIS) are critical public health professionals who work to stop the spread of infections that threaten communities throughout Missouri.



DIS Training



DIS are trained professionals, informed about the causes and spread of STIs, skilled in taking sexual histories, identifying and locating people who may have been exposed to or tested positive for an STI, and know where to refer people for testing and treatment.

Disease Intervention Specialists

DIS provide counseling about behaviors that put a person at risk for STIs, including HIV infection. DIS also offers STI education outreach to health care providers, community-based organizations, and the public.



DIS Focus On:

- Providing the patient with information about their disease and ways to prevent infection in the future.
- Notifying and locating unaware partners so they can receive confidential and prompt diagnosis and treatment.


DIS and Partner Notification



- Arrive at a plan for partner notification with the patient
- Coach the patient if the patient wants to inform their partner on how to inform their partner
- In some cases, patients prefer DIS to inform their partner.

DIS and Partner Notification

- When a DIS notifies exposed partners, identifying information about the original patient is <u>never</u> disclosed.
- DIS conduct their work in a confidential manner and are trained to work with diverse populations while maintaining a sense of urgency.



Tell Your Partner


Tell Your Partner is a free service that allows a text to be sent to a sexual partner who might be at risk of an STI. If you text a partner using this service, it will **alway**s be anonymous.



Tell Your Partner

This anonymous notification option assists with improving the rate of partner notification. The goal is to get partners tested, diagnosed and treated, if needed. This service takes less than two (2) minutes to complete.




Ryan White Case Management



STI Prevention, Testing, and Treatment

STI Program

- Over 180 program partners
 - LPHAs
 - CommunityOrganizations
 - Colleges and Universities
- Testing through the State Public Health Lab
- Free STI medications
 - Chlamydia
 - Gonorrhea
 - Syphilis
- Condom Distribution

Partners

- People living with HIV
- AIDS service organizations
- Local public health agencies (LPHAs)
- Substance use centers
- Organizations that serve minority populations
- Community-based organizations
- Public and private universities

Viral Hepatitis Prevention Program

Viral Hepatitis

- Hepatitis C Elimination
 Plan
 - Increase access to hepatitis C prevention, testing, and treatment for all Missouri citizens.
- Prevention Education



Viral Hepatitis

- Rapid Testing Program
 - Tests for HCV Antibodies
 - Determines exposure to Hepatitis C virus (HCV)
 - Simple finger stick of blood
 - Results in 20 minutes



Viral Hepatitis

- HBV and HCV confirmatory testing
 - Free through the MO
 State Public Health Lab
- Patient Navigation
 - Telehealth Referrals to HCV treating providers
 - Lab draws local to the client
 - Ships medications right to the client's door
