

Our essential goal is to provide quality services to enhance the health, safety, and well-being of persons, age 60 and over, enabling them to live in their own homes for as long and independently, as possible.

About Aging Matters

Aging Matters is one of ten Area Agencies on Aging in the State of Missouri. Nationwide, there are over 600 agencies, all established under the Older Americans Act in 1973 to respond to the needs of Americans 60 and over in every local community. By providing a range of options that allow older adults to choose the home and community-based services and living arrangements that suit them best, AAAs make it possible for older adults to remain in their homes and communities as long as possible.

An eighteen-member Board of Directors governs Aging Matters. One delegate from each county is elected by adults, 60 years of age and older, living in the service area.

Programs & Services

Nutrition Program

- 32 Senior Centers in our service area provide nutritious noon meals Monday through Friday
- Home delivered meals are available for persons 60+ that are not physically or mentally able to visit the center and lacks transportation to the center
- Supportive services are offered, including recreational activities, educational programs, information and assistance, outreach, and health and welfare counseling
- A Distance Dining program is available for clients 63+ and reside outside the delivery area of a senior center

Information & Assistance

- Specialists provide much needed information about available services and resources
- Assistance with specific issues, such as Medicare, Medicaid, insurance, personal assistance or mediation with a specific problem
- Medicare boot camps provide valuable information
- Assistance with Med D enrollment

Long Term Care Ombudsman Program

- The Ombudsman Program was established by the Older American's Act to be a 'voice' for residents in long term care facilities, assuring that resident rights are upheld
- Advocates for individual residents, educates and informs the public regarding resident rights and long term care facility issues
- Provides information on options to nursing home placement
- Call for information about becoming an ombudsman volunteer



In Home Services

- Most seniors want to remain living at home for as long as possible, but sometimes need help with various tasks and activities
- Whether you live alone, with family or friends, or in a retirement community, inhome services can help
- Needs vary from person to person and change with age
- To be eligible for services you must be age 60 or older
- Homemaker chores is a housekeeping service available to assist with tasks you are physically unable to do
- Personal care is available to help with bathing and other special needs

We Listen, We Help

Family Caregiver Program

- Established by the Administration on Aging in November 2000 and opened in Southeast Missouri in August of 2001 with the mission of empowering and supporting unpaid family caregivers
- Family caregiving is the act of assisting someone you care about who is 60 or older and is chronically ill or disabled and no longer able to care for themselves
- We support caregivers by providing educational programs, support groups and individual information and assistance; providing limited respite; and limited supplies assistance
